



Hull Safeguarding Children Partnership Business Priorities and Delivery Plan September 2021 - 2023

Priority 1: Neglect – Safeguarding and protecting children from neglect

Neglect is identified as the most prevalent form of abuse; both nationally and locally. It is the primary reason for children in Hull having a Child Protection Plan. Hull Safeguarding Children Partnership will ensure that there is a clearly embedded multi-agency response to children and young people experiencing neglect. Practitioners across all agencies will be supported to identify neglect, understand the impact on children and young people and respond to this at the earliest opportunity. All relevant agencies should also have an understanding of the correlation between neglect and adult carer issues and how these impact on children and young people; including domestic abuse, parental mental health and substance misuse.

Outcome for children and young people

Children and young people who are neglected will have their needs recognised early and receive the right level of support to achieve long lasting safety and positive change.

Priority 2: Contextual Safeguarding

The Hull Safeguarding Children Partnership will work with all partner agencies to identify and reduce the number of children affected by exploitation. The focus will be on ensuring that there is a good understanding across the partnership of the complex and inter-related risks associated with child exploitation to enable support and intervention to take place at the earliest opportunity to reduce this. Practitioners will be supported to recognise the early signs of risk so that preventative intervention can be provided. We will provide a joined up, multiagency response to children and young people who are at risk of, or subjected to, exploitation.

Outcome for children and young people

Children and young people in Hull are protected from child exploitation and support is in place for children and young people at risk so that the partnership has assurance that the approach to safeguarding children and young people from harm outside the home is effective.

Priority 3: Domestic Abuse

The Hull Safeguarding Children Partnership will work closely with Hull Community Safety Partnership (Domestic Abuse Strategic Group), and other agencies, to ensure that effective protection and support is provided to children, young people and their families who experience domestic abuse. The Hull Safeguarding Children Partnership will also work with partners to support ongoing early intervention and preventative work to raise awareness of domestic abuse to prevent this occurring.

Outcome for children and young people

The partnership is assured that agencies are working effectively to improve the wellbeing of children affected by domestic abuse.
